On 30 May Diotima returns to Fontainebleau to take part in ProQuartet's Fifth 'Rencontres Musicales'. They will perform works by Ligeti, Lutoslawski and present, in part, a new work by Hanspeter Kyburz. A Berlin Festival and Musica Strasbourg commission, Kyburz's first string quartet will be given its première performances in September 04.

Première in Munich

Vermilion for clarinet, electric guitar and cello, commissioned by the Munich Biennale, will be performed in the Klangspüren series on 17 March 2004 by Ensemble TrioLog. This 'discussion/concert' will include Saunders' Molly Song 3 – shades of crimson for alto flute, viola and acoustic guitar, and works by Bach, Webern, Feldman and Rihm.

Vermilion will be given its second performance by the ensemble musikFabrik at a weekend portrait of Saunders' work presented by the Sligo New Music Festival (27–28 March).

Future commissions

Saunders is currently working on a large-scale piece commissioned by South West German Radio for the Donaueschinger Musiktage (October 04), scored for 2 soloists, piano and accordion, voices and orchestra. This will be followed by a duo for two pianos (Rolf Hind and Nicolas Hodges) commissioned by the BBC for this year's Huddersfield Contemporary Music Festival Commissions for 2005 and 2006 include new works for the Freiburg Baroque Orchestra (Siemens ArtsProgram for the Lucerne Festival), solo double bass (Casa da Musica, Oporto), the ensemble musikFabrik, and the NDR Symphony Orchestra.

Shadowtime takes as its point of departure the life and work of Walter Benjamin (1892–1940). Benjamin is one of the most influential philosophers and cultural critics of the twentieth century. Born in Berlin, he died on the Spanish border while trying to escape the fate that awaited most of his fellow Central European Jews. In its seven scenes, Shadowtime explores some of the major themes of Benjamin's work, including the nature of language, the possibilities for a transformational cultural politics, and the role of materiality and memory in art.

Scene 2 of *Shadowtime*, an instrumental interlude entitled *Les Froissements des Ailes de Gabriel* (2003) for solo guitar and ensemble (13 players), was given its concert première at the Judith Wright Arts Centre Brisbane on 2 February 2004. Soloist Geoffrey Morris and ELISION were conducted by Franck Ollu.

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
